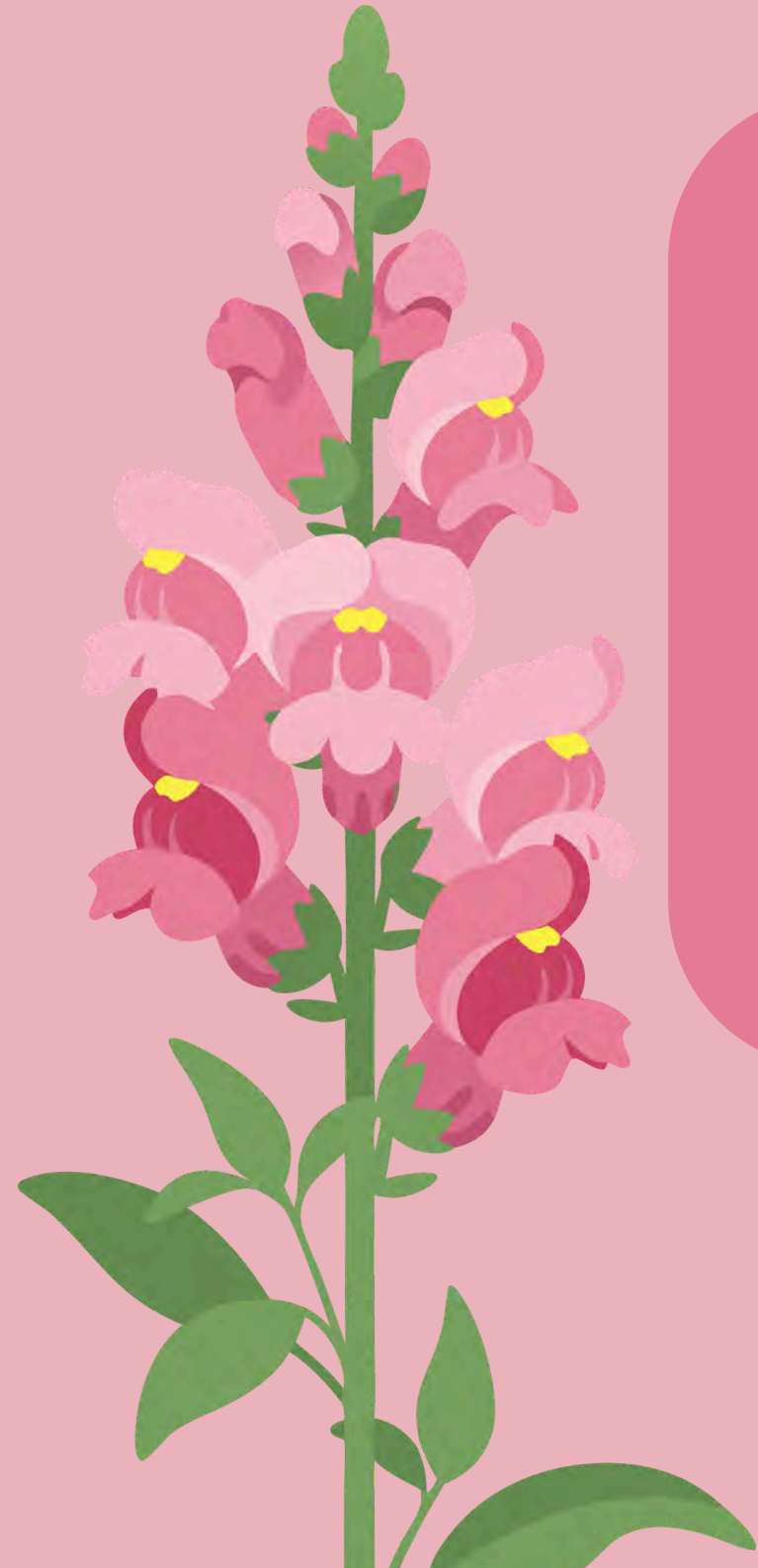

SESSION 1

Before: 1/4 sunflowers and 3/4 weeds

- Duties:

- Weeding the field
- Harvesting the leftover sunflowers
- Clearing the dripline

- Tools: hula-hoe, shovels, rakes, and snips



SESSION 2

- One of our horticulturalists rototilled the soil
 - Why? To soften the soil for planting & mix needed nutrients
- Post tilling: repair, lay the drip line, fixing holes, and testing the irrigation system
- Tools used: giant rototilled, dirt rakes, shovels, garden staples

Snapdragon

Antirrhinum majus

- Snapdragon (*Antirrhinum majus*) is a vibrant flowering plant native to Mediterranean regions
- "Snapdragon" originates from the flowers reaction to having their throats squeezed, which causes the "mouth" of the flower to snap open like a dragons mouth
- Used in nutritional and herbal products
- Many other species in the genus, and in the family *Scrophulariaceae* more widely, have common names that include the word "snapdragon". *Antirrhinum molle* is known as "dwarf snapdragon" in the UK

Globe Amaranth

Gomphrena haageana / *Gomphrena globosa*

- Native to Guatemala, Panama, and Brazil
- *Gomphrena* - from the Latin word *gomphaena*, an ancient classical name for amaranth *globosa* - Latin for "globe" or "sphere"
- Often used for leis in the Hawaiin and Nepali culture. Used as a natural food dye for its distinct color.
- *Gomphrena* is a genus of 139 species in the family *Amaranthaceae*

Celosia



Celosia argentea plumosa / *Celosia argentea cristata*

- Herb in the amaranth family (*Amaranthaceae*) native to Africa
- Tender annual often grown in gardens
- Both leaves and flowers are edible
- The name Celosia comes from the Greek word for burning, because the flowers are shaped like flames

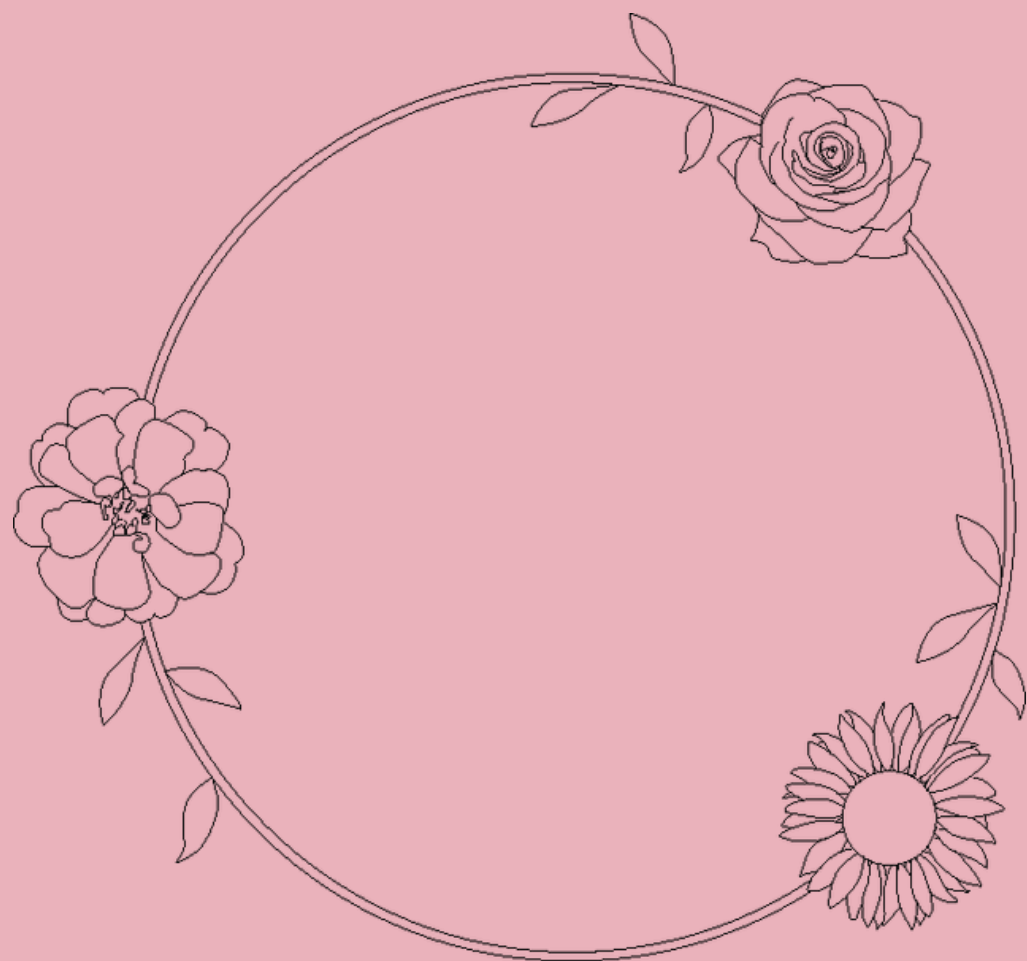
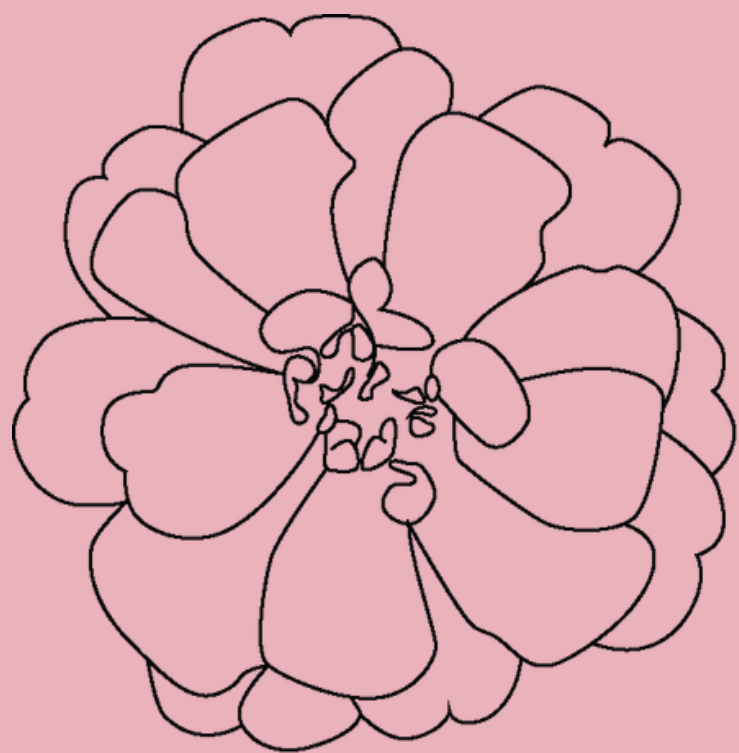
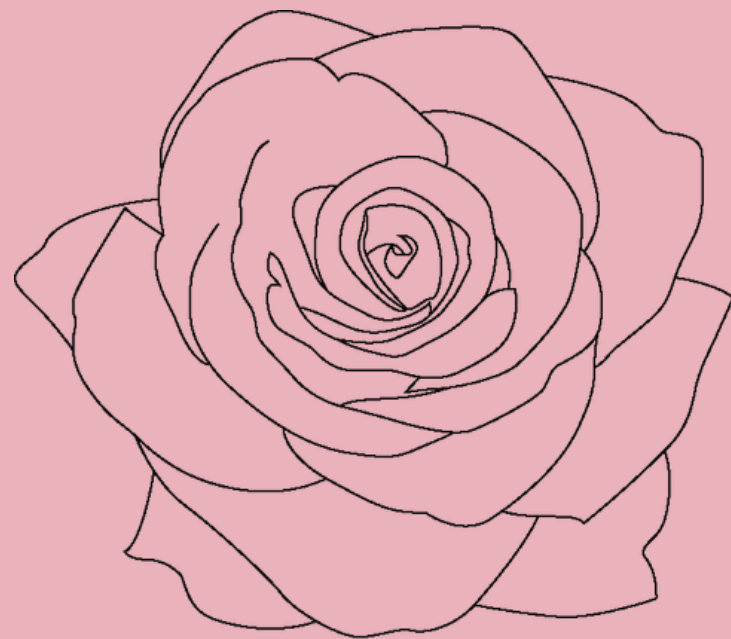
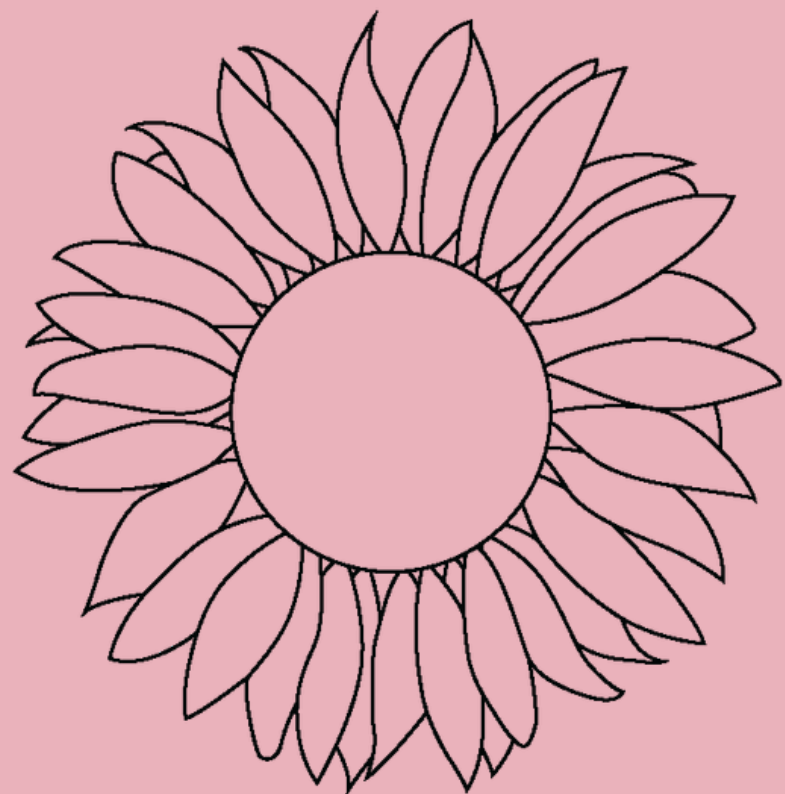


Salvia viridis

- Native to the southern European region
- Viridis, refers to the color green, with implications of youth and vigor
- A pollinator plant for bees to make honey and an infusion of leaves can be used for sore gums
- Salvia is the largest genus of plants in the family *Lamiaceae* with the number of species estimated to range from 700 to nearly 3,000. Members include shrubs, herbaceous, perennials, and annuals

COMMON MARIGOLD FACTS:

- Scientific name is *Calendula officinalis*
- These flowers live in the daisy family of plants
- They have been used for medicine all over the continent of Europe and India
- Observe how the leaves are hairy. This is to help with moisture and sunlight protection
- These types of flowers typically have a spicier aroma (smell)

CARING FOR THE COMMON MARIGOLD:

- Requires full sun, 6 or more hours of sunlight a day
- Water every 3-5 days
- When you get home it is time to move it to a bigger pot (do as fit)
- If needed, dead flowers can be cut off carefully with a pair of scissors to help continue growth

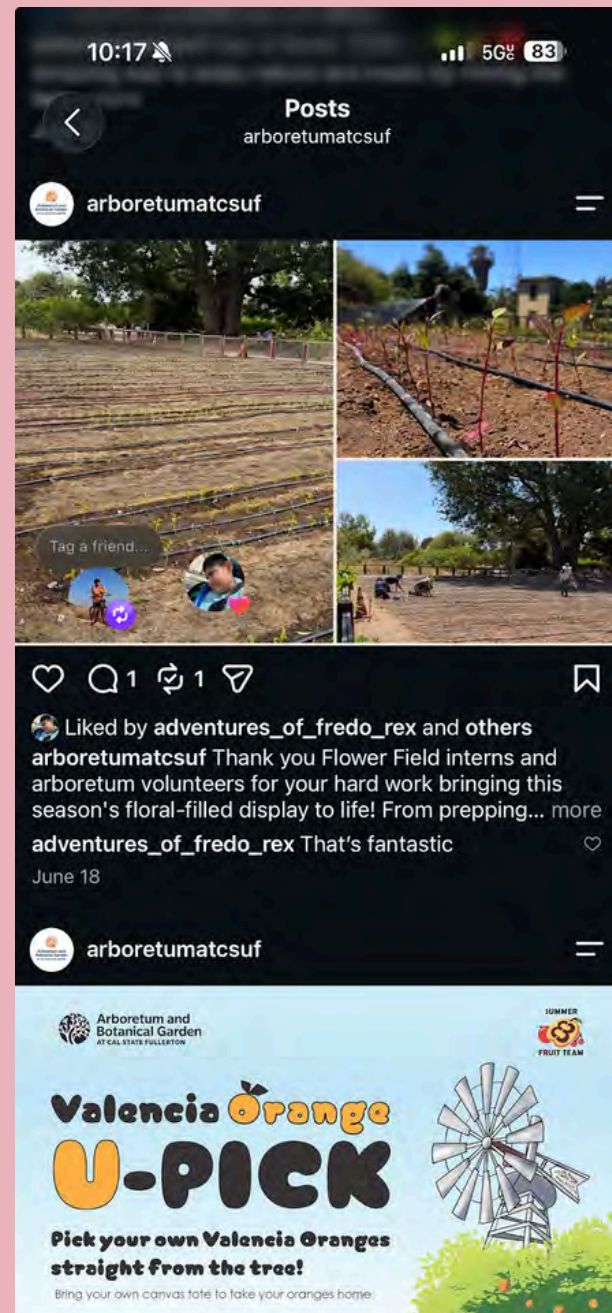
